CALLING ALL TUG BOAT SKIPPERS!!!

ITS TIME FOR THE 2014 PACIFIC TUG REGATTA



August is here and that means time to see who is the best tug skipper around at the 19th annual event known as **Pa***cific NW Tug Regatta*. This fun all day event is held on the 3rd Saturday of each August (16th

this year) at Downtown Park in Bellevue and open to anyone with a model tug or towing vessel. What is required of the day from the captains and their vessels? Glamorous tug work including barge handling through a navigation course and doing a salvage job of one of the derelict vessels all the while being judged by professional mariners. The person with the best combined score is the winner of the **Pacific NW Tug Regatta**.

How are boat classes decided you ask? Unlike other events, boats are divided into classes based on weight--not length (weight is ballasted with batteries--not light with no fuel). Classes are: **Small** (*under 15 lbs*), **Medium** (*15.01 to 30 lbs*), **Large** (*every thing over 30.01 lbs*), **Vintage** (*long, skinny boat, open rudder, no bow thrusters or knozzels and usually not as maneuverable*), and a **Masters** (*winners in the*

Northwest RC Ship modelers Regatta 1st in scale class and overall awards

It was discussed and voted on that once a boat has taken the 1st place award in scale in any class at the Northwest RC Ship modelers Regatta it can no longer be entered in scale competition at future Northwest RC Ship modelers Regattas. We clarified that this also means that if you take 1st place in scale and do not win the Overall Best Of Show Trophy at that regatta then that boat will not be able to win the Overall Best Of Show Trophy at any future Northwest RC Ship modelers Regattas. This will be incorporated in the club rules and Regatta Rules for the future. It was this way in the past and over the years it was forgotten and not enforced. This it to give more boats a chance at winning 1st in scale in any of the classes we use for the future regattas.

Show and tell



Allan Wing showed his new articulated wing powered sailboat.

Tom Stevens described how to use old automotive serpentine belts for slings to lift boats in and out of the water.

Tom showed designs and discussed the use of "Orville hooks" for use in the salvage event at the upcoming Northwest Tug Regatta. He pointed out that in the full scale tug scene they also use "Orville hooks" to retrieve loose tows and loose barges with





chain hanging down.

Robert Osmond showed some jumper cables/ test leads that he had made using the more finely built and with finer jaws electric meter alligator clamps. He said that these finer toothed jaws grabbed the wire better (stronger springs), had more texture for your fingers to control them with and also almost all of the metal is covered with hard plastic so they would not easily bump together and short circuit what you are testing. They were very easy to solder after using a little dab of tinning flux. (see photo showing these alligator clamps in their normal use on meter leads and then as jumper cables/flexible test leads).

There was one quick gust that caught the boat sideways and caused it to capsize. Al Kinsman rescued it and the inside was still dry.

The early start time was good because by noon it was getting rather warm and many people were packing up and heading home. It was a good day and everyone had a good time in the sunny warm weather.





2014 Tidewater Cup - Mel Suelzle



July 26th was the date of the 2014 Tidewater Cup at the Avista pond in Spokane. Four members of our club attended this year. **Bob Wickham**, **Al Kinsman**, **Dave White**, and myself I rounded our West coast team for the event. Lee Stewart took a break from his motorcycle outing in Republic and spent a few hours with us as well. We had a cameo appearance by Ron Burchett who was traveling to Massachusetts to deliver a couple of very cool training tugs. The were high-end Z-drive tugs with very sophisticated drive and control systems to replicate real world training experiences for future skippers.

The event participation was smaller this year as the Spokane club had a couple of new members but continues to shrink as medical/domestic plumbing issues took its toll on event attendance. The events consisted of 2 separate competitions. One event is for Springer class boats that requires skippers to take a barge through a very complex course, weaving in and around 18 large and unforgiving boulders. The course complexity demands you have a navigator to allow the skipper to concentrate on navigation around and thorough rock lined passages some with only an inch or so to spare. This most challenging course is difficult to run without hitting at least one rock. It is timed as well to break any ties. This year's Springer event winners were:

1st Place Randy Seiser 2nd Place Mel Suelzle 3rd Place Al Kinsman

In the Tidewater event, the West side skippers also did well in this event.		
Small Class;	1 st Place – Mel Suelzle	2 nd Place – Randy Seiser
Medium class;	1 st Place - Dave White	-
Large class	1st Place Al Kinsman	2nd Place Ron Hinton

Combined scores of all classes resulted in a tie between Mel and Al Kinsman. Elapsed time was used as a tie breaker. Mel's run was two minutes faster than Al's, so Mel Suelzle was crowned 2014 Tidewater champion.

As usual, the awards were followed by a nice meal in celebration of a most successful and entertaining day. If you have never attended the Tidewater event, you should seriously consider it in your future plans. It is normally held on the last Saturday of July. This is very fun model boat event in a park-like setting, nice weather and the best tug/barge navigation courses anywhere! Everything's setup and nicely hosted by a great bunch of guys (and wives) from the Spokane Model Boat Club.

past 3 years.. This includes those that won under the Foss Cup). All style tugs (single or multi-screw, tractor style, enhanced tugs with bow thrusters or knozzels) compete against each other per class.

In **Navigation** with a barge, each captain is responsible for *on the wire, on the hip, in the notch/pushing*) so best to have your own lines ready or you can use the supplied ones. Barges should be 3 times the size of the vessel, so don't take a small little barge if you have a big boat. We welcome you bring your barge for others to use, but encourage you to take another one for the challenge.

Salvage you need to use a device to snag the line of the derelict vessel from out in the open water so



that it is not a navigational hazard. This is towed behind the boat and will need to" grab" a line hanging from the vessel so you can tow it into the harbor where you will need to dock it for repairs. The thing here is that the docking is a precision docking--need to get the line on the derelict vessel to line up with marking on the dock. Like hitting a bulls eye in darts, points are higher if on the middle mark. caveat is once the vessel make contact with the dock, you must pin it in place-no sliding the vessel around. So planning is best when approaching this.

Now for those that want an extra challenge we have the

ever popular **Team Tow** event. This event is separate from the scoring and has it's own award. You can use the tug that ran the other events or a different one if you like. The unique part of this event is that you will be paired with another boat by random drawing. We do this to make it a little more challenging to move the freighter around as more than likely, you may not have worked with the other captain before. This is a rather simple job of moving the freighter away from the landing, through a couple sets of buoys and back to the landing all the while maintaining control of the freighter. Be warned--the freighter is 9 foot long and weighs upwards of 600 pounds! Communication is key to this event as the freighter has been known to take down victims that were unprepared (see markings on the bridge wings).

Entry fee is a flat \$10.00 and will include a lunch. We go with the 2 boat max for this event as it is a little more time consuming with the extra activities to be done, but encourage you to bring as many as you want for display or just to have fun in the open water. Registration will open as soon as we have it ready at 8 am and stays open until 10 am. There will also be a raffle with great donated prizes by our supporters of this event. Tickets will be sold through out the day and will have smaller drawings starting in the afternoon with the top items being done at the end of the event. Event is scheduled to be over at 4 pm if all goes smoothly and skippers are ready with their tugs. Lunch and refreshments will be provided around the noon time.

As with any event there is a need for help through out the day. Can use help in all areas but really need those that can spend some time helping move derelict vessels back out in the open water once done and in the barge basin with keeping barges at the ready. We appreciate all help when setting up and taking down as well.

So come on out to the *Pacific NW Tug Regatta*. Bring your favorite workhorse(s) to do the jobs of the day, display your boats, or just to catch the action. Good time to test your skills and share the comrade ship of other fellow modelers for the day. Any questions, feel free to ask me.
