

Fall Springer Event September 19th Bellevue Pond

The event was attended by eight members. The weather was overcast but there was no rain.

There were two groups of four boats each. The winners of each group ran for the Glory. The first round was won by Dave White. The second was won by Bill Heath running Robert Osmond's tried and True "Toe Boat". For the final round Scott Bauman and our new member Amos ran to keep Bill and Dave honest.


To start the race the four competitors were told to mill around in the cove while the four barges, which were made of 2x10s with 1/4" thick guide walls were aligned together and held up tight together side by side until the springers arrived to try to get into the notch on a barge. At this point all the barges would start skittering about like wild horses and then the fun began as each competitor tried to catch a barge and get in the notch. This took most of the time in each round. The barges were pushed 50+ feet sometimes before the Springer would get in the notch and start exerting control and head back for the first gate. Of course access to the first gate was sometimes blocked by someone else coming from the other direction or a cross direction since that is where they finally caught up with their barge and got control. See one picture with all for springers in their notches but all heading in different directions to get back to the first gate. It was good fun and the participants said they enjoyed it.




It only looks like confusion. There is only one course.



The skills being practiced were modeled after real towboats and barges, since sometimes towboats and tugboats are parted from their tows and have to reacquire them. Also the slowing of the Springer and the barge pulling away simulated and showed the how the different masses decelerate at different rates. It was also good practice pushing a barge through very tight gates. Most of the gates were only about 2' wide and close together, so going fast meant that

you would miss the turn in for the next gate which was out of line with the previous gates, so there was a lot of doubling back to catch missed gates. All of the skippers did well.

NOVEMBER FUN FLOAT—Lake Ballenger

Our November Fun Float is scheduled for November 7th. As the Bellevue Pond is likely drained for the winter, we have selected Lake Ballinger in Mountlake terrace for November Float,

Lake Ballenger a 103-acre lake with a 3-acre island, jointly owned by the Cities of Mountlake Terrace and Edmonds. The Lake Ballinger Park, 2-acre park, is located on the east shore of the lake and south of the Lake Ballinger Golf Course, and offers one of the only access points to the lake. Year-round fishing is available. Amenities include a boat launch for non-gas powered boats, a fishing pier, beach access, picnic tables, barbecue grills, and restroom facilities.
