Seattle Yacht Club Map



The Seattle Yacht Club is located on Portage Bay at 1807 East Hamlin Street, Seattle WA, 98112, just north of the 520 bridge across Lake Washington and south of the University of Washington


Guests arriving via Highway 520 (either East or West bound), exit at Montlake Blvd and head north. Turn left on East Hamlin at the traffic light which is the first left past 520. For those exiting from 520 westbound, you probably cannot turn directly westbound onto Hamlin, because

you are in the right lane and there is not time to get over to the left turn lane. If so, turn right (eastbound) onto Hamlin, go around the block, to the left, then turn left onto Montlake Blvd, and an immediate right onto Hamlin. It's a long way around, but it works!

If you cross the Montlake Bridge you've gone too far. The club is in a residential area on the left.

WHY BUILD SHIP MODELS?



What, then, are the true reasons that an individual would want to build a ship model? Why would anyone subject himself to untold hours of eyestrain, cramped fingers, or frustration in the pursuit of scale-modeled perfection? How can anyone take this in stride, suffering in silence? You need but look at the ship model to find the answer.

There it is, finished at last! A thing of beauty, a joy forever. This creation is a modeler's child. It was conceived in his mind, born of his skill, delivered by his own hand. It is a ship model for all to see, for all to admire. He built this ship model. It is, in his eyes, sheer perfection-that is, until the next one is completed.

A modeler, a good modeler, is constantly planning while he builds. As he works, he can see what needs to be improved. The mistakes corrected or covered over, need to be eliminated. The next model will be even better than this one. It must be. Believe me, I know.

Only the builder has a need to know where the flaws lie. He is under no obligation to confess their existence. Confession, if it can be called such, will be in the interest of increasing shipbuilding skills. Flaws and minor building mistakes are to be shown only to understanding fellows. They, who have made the same mistakes, will assist in eliminating his. Mistakes will always be made. It is the process of learning. Advancement can be defined as not making the same mistakes again. Wisdom is seeing the mistakes made by others, based on your own education, and pointing it out-tactfully. A modeler is a mover. Standing still is stagnation of creative talent. A constant, never-ending process of improvement should be going on at all times.

A good modeler will continue this dedication to the end of his days. Modeling might not be continuous, but the dedication is there, implanted forever. He will dream his dreams. He will gather his materials, storing supplies for the future like a squirrel. He will maintain that hidden desire for constant self-improvement. The bits and pieces that make up his model are not mere inanimate objects, nor is his creation. Ship models will always be in preparation, to be built and completed in the future.

Ship models he will build will be those that will carry him to his greatest reward, his own personal adventure. He will build, create, and display the fruits of his labor without shame, proudly telling all who will listen the history of the ship, the struggle of construction. Then the day will come, as it must to us all, when he will lay his tools aside for the last time. He will close his eyes to dream of that perfect model yet to come.

Remaining behind will be his models. They are and will always be the tangible tribute to his everlasting memory-a legacy to his descendants and to the world. His life was dedicated to his craft, devoid of despair, yet filled with failures. The failures that were overcome are the tribute in the making of a memory of a man. What finer tribute can be said of a person than " ... and he built ship models."

- ⇒ You do not need a pass to drop off and pick up your model(s), although you get a Friday pass with your registration. You can bring your scale models into the Expo starting Friday 8:00 AM, but before Saturday judging.
- ⇒ You should plan to have the models on display before judging on Saturday at 11:00 AM. Models must be left on display until after our awards ceremony at 12:00 noon Sunday.
- ⇒ For maximum points your model should have a documentation package showing colors, sizes and construction details! The documentation usually includes a 3-D view drawing, photos of the full scale one, color swatches, and possibly some historical information.
- ⇒ Incentives For Entries of All Ages: Overall Best in Show: \$ 100.00
 - Best in each category \$ 25.00
 - ⇒ Awards for second and third places
