

Meeting October 6th - Mel

Dave's first agenda item included kicking off the show 'n tell segment of our meeting . Dave started with a showing of his recent Costco find of a set of 6 remote controlled LED lights. They are compact and individually controlled for on/off and brightness



Tom Stevens brought in his new counter rotating blade cut-off tool he used to cut fiberglass panels. This \$39 (Harbor Freight) tool made nice clean cuts in a straight line

Following Tom, Bob Wickham showed his most recent mini-boat additions to his fleet. His recently completed Tuna Clipper is nicely done as all of Bob's boats. His is working on powering his Lindberg Mine Sweeper. He uses servo control systems powering this twin screw boat and found it necessary to up-

grade the motors over those used in servos. Bob showed some nice lighting systems he purchased from Evan's Design. This tiny LED systems are perfect for Bob's mini-fleet.



Doug Wilson showed a nice Swiss made carving knife he purchased from Woodcrafters. It is very heavy duty and has a nice sharp edge for wood carving.

Phil Northup showed his new sub. He thinks it's ready for his test tank. He has his power switch operated by the periscope

and a viewing port to see and power LED. This is a beautiful small model that will likely see it's maiden run at Monroe in a few months.





Amos Arrdvold brought in his nice little tug "Cooper". This is a Dumas kit that Amos did a nice job building. He leaned how to make nice pudding and fenders and is ready to mount the propeller he just received from Harbor Models. The name "Cooper" is in memory of his bull dog that he lost last February.



Robert Osmond showed his steel hulled boat kit purchased at Lake Goodwin. This very old kit is made in Japan and comes with a very complete fittings kit. Robert also showed his aluminum hulled Edwardian launch he is building. It has a single cylinder steam engine and boiler.

Mel showed a inexpensive sanding block he recently found at Lowe's.

Dave reviewed Scott's comments about he successful Lake Goodwin event and the Fisherman's Memorial event in Ballard. The Fisherman's festival had great weather, a great crowd as usual. LAKE BOB FUN FLOAT - September 18th, 2016 Mel Suelzle







ALL this food and a fun filled evening for the modest sum of \$20/person.


The Spaghetti Factory has lots of parking. Some may want to use the upper parking lot that is on the same level of the restaurant and avoid the entry way steps.


