From The Wheelhouse

The month of June brings us to our most important event of the year. Preparation for our 39th Regatta is in high gear and we hope to have a great turnout for this event. We have just finished with one of the busiest weeks of our boating season. This seems only appropriate as it was Opening Day Week for the local big boat

community as well. The day began with a well-attended fun float at the Seattle Yacht Club, our May meeting the next day and of course our Fun Float at Bellevue Pond. Also this fun float included a Springer Boat Blind Con event that involved 8 skipper and 1st mate teams. It is nice to see the enthusiasm and support of our membership at each of these events.


By the time you read this we will be about three weeks from the Regatta. There is plenty of time to get your boats ready and tackle the challenging course that Robert Osmond has created. Remember one of the unique aspects of our Regatta it is that is open to any and all type of boats as long as it is not gas powered. Our goal in designing the course is to keep it compact so to not overly stress the depth perception for the skippers while still being possible to navigate by the larger boats. Larger boats are very popular as they look great on the water and often provide lots of room for special features. We do not want to discourage skippers from entering them in the Regatta. Any skipper can enlist the aid of a tug to help negotiate the tighter turns. However, some practice is suggested before the day of the Regatta to turn in the best possible performance.

We have a great bunch of raffle prizes for the Regatta. Many of our vendors have contributed nice prizes to support our club and help fund the Regatta. Additionally several members have donated items to the Regatta as well. We appreciate everyone's support and hope that our members will look to those vendors that support us for their modeling needs.

Last year we hoped to bring back some form of scale judging to our Regattas. While a more comprehensive plan did not develop, we decided to incorporate a separate award for scale appearance and operation on the navigation course. Scoring will be a subjective assessment by each of the two navigation judges. An award will be given to the highest combined score given by the judges. Remember it is how scale your boat looks AND how scale you operate it on the course with due consideration for the size of the vessel. The scale score will not be factored into the navigation scores.

Also new this year is the way we measure boats for determining the class. Because of the broad range of designs and unusual bumpers, bow spirits and other deck and hull characteristics, this year we will determine the class by measuring the hull length at the waterline. Being more difficult to measure, we will have a Super-Sized Caliper specially marked for each of the classes.

Pictured below is the preliminary version number 2 of the course layout planned for this event. Robert Osmond is still tweaking the design, but major changes are not expected.


