In meeting with Bellevue's Parks Department, we finally got the dates straight for our fun floats and regattas. Because of some schedule conflicts with the City of Bellevue's Parks schedule, we needed to change a couple club dates. A night float is now August 16th and a fun float on September 16th. He passed around a list of what is needed and requested members to sign up to help. From attending many regattas myself, I have seen what it takes to be successful. ## Show and Tell

This is a great way to show off your projects and help others with theirs. Every time I bring a boat someone is always curious about its features. It could be anything from wood to paint propellers to motors and lights to bow thrusters. We would really love to see everyone's projects. Don't be shy. It is great fun to get your project some attention. It is amazing what I have learned from everyone over the years. Take advantage of the expertise of our members. They are some of the best in the country. Also, some of you experts should take a shot at presenting about something in which you specialize. We need to continuously pass on the secrets of the trade.

Robert Osmond started the show with his PBR that was almost complete at the last meeting. It is finished now so hopefully we'll see it running soon. It is beautiful and we should marvel at the detail.


He also brought a steam launch hull and associated parts. It has a high-quality steam engine that is made for the hull.


Bob Brown jumped in next. He brought a kit of a PT-109 that he is going to put together. He is working with Harbor Models store to get all the running gear and stuff.


Masaaki Seki brought a very interesting model kit. Amazingly, it is an electric motor working torpedo that can dive, but is not remote controlled. Who knows how it submerges or if it explodes? But, it is certainly interesting. Maybe the warship types should watch out or you might get sunk.


Dave Green seems to always come up with something. He was giving away some partially built boats, plans and parts. He brought a partially built lightship. The frames were already put together and almost ready to plank. There were also plans available of the C.G. lightship, harbor tug, and Whaleback freighter. I love plans of boats so I was going crazy over his stuff. I think I will grab some plans from him. Paul Williams got the whaleback ship plans.

Paul Williams talked about Britain historical steam powered submarines. They built twenty-three of them during WWI. The paperback book is "The K Boats" by Don Everitt and available to borrow from Paul. Dave Green being the first borrower. Paul also had some past Model Boats magazines to given away.


Chris Merrill added a written write up about his Show and Tell. "I was clearing out some spaces and found a large collection of empty medicine containers, so I soaked them in hot water to remove the labels and brought them to offer as small waterproof storage for items like AA or AAA batteries, Allen wrenches, etc. I also brought a few 4 or 6 section cardboard handled carriers that could be used for a small kit carrier for remote controller, LiPo batteries, grease or lube, turkey baster syphon, rags/paper towels, small parts container, etc.

I brought the light buoy maps book that Dane Webster passed on to me to ask the attendees what interest there was in setting up a course for practice at the April and May daytime Fun Floats. I will plan to try out my new waders and the buoys at both."

Tom Edwards gave us a little show about building his new basement boat shop. It was just a storage area when he purchased the house. First picture was the before and others show the work space and shelves for holding his boats. His next plan is to build a boat pond. What a deal! I want to work there!


For the grand finale, Robert Osmond put together a little show about adhesives and glues. I did not know there were some many. It was very interesting to hear about all the differences between them. Fillers are also included with adhesives and can really do some great things. As a matter of fact, the life vests on his PBR were made from filler.

Dumas' Brooklyn Tug Kit by Club member Ken Valk. The kit is factory sealed, new in the box, with the original Dumas made single piece fiberglass and white gel coat hull. The kit was purchased from Dumas in 2003. In 2005 Dumas closed their fiberglass division and their current Brooklyn kits come with a 2piece ABS Plastic hulls. This kit also includes the original unopened building and accessory fitting kit.

The hull is $391 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ long, $91 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide, scale size is $1 / 32^{\text {nd }}$, and appears to be in perfect condition.
