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
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From the Quarterdeck

November meeting

Under new business Allan tried to hand out name tags but the new members were not present. However, Dain Webster requested one. Visitors were **Sandy Chinn** and her cousin, **Ron Tatsumi**, who is visiting from the Dallas Ft. Worth area. Our December meeting and pig out was discussed noting all was set with the caterer. However more members need to sign up and pay \$30 per person in order to make it economically feasible. Allan mentioned that dues for 2011 are ready to be collected by our treasurer, Ed Maurer.

The Marine Expo is set for the 18 -20th of this month and all were encouraged to attend and to get in touch with Ron Burchett to obtain a vendor pass if you will be bringing a boat to display and run in his pond. This is a great event with lots of displays and marine info and a chance to hob nob with all the dignitaries of this industry. Lunch with the guys at the local brew pub is also a high light. Allan mentioned that it was time to nominate and elect officers for next year and before he could finish Dave White moved to reelect our present officers and this motion was resoundingly approved by everyone present. **Dennis Chinn** announced that a polo event will take place at his pool on Saturday the 13th at 10 AM. If the weather is inclement then we will have a gab session indoors and discuss methods of improving performance, etc. Donuts coffee and pizza usually allay any hunger pangs. This is becoming a premier event and everyone should participate. New polo boats appear on the scene often and some of the old ones having been repaired also return.

This months fun float will be held at the new pond at the south Lake Union Park, weather permitting. Nominations for the Cliff Shaw award are due by the 13th and can be e-mailed to r.bray@frontier.com or phoned to 425 778 9223. This award is to be given to the person who contributes new ideas and building techniques, attends most of the club functions and who is willing to lend a hand to members who are in need of help with their projects. **Dave White** mentioned he would like some parts from old Radio Flyer wagons to construct a wagon to transport his



models. **Tom Stevens** told him to stop by his place as he has the necessary items. Dave also inquired as to where he could acquire old fashioned hair curlers for his smoke stack surround and **Mel** told him he could purchase them at the dollar store, as he had just bought some for his mother.

After a short break, it was time for show and tell and presentation of models to be judged by **Mike Shaw** for best build of the year.

Dain Webster started off by showing the neat plastic box he bought at Lowes to carry his coast guard boat. He proceeded to demonstrate modifications to his boat which included the recent purchase and installation of a P 74 dual esc, mixer controller from Action Electronics allowing him to vary the speed and direction of the motors while effecting a turn. Someone mentioned that Harbor Models carries this product.

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Next, **Norm Hiatt** presented his Greek trireme, Olympia, for judging. It is fully operational and a true work of art and engineering. The vessel has 170 oars and the oarsmen were paid rather than conscripted as in Roman vessels. He has done a lot of research into this project and has a lot of knowledge on the subject.





Dennis Chinn presented his Cape Kuper, a Canadian Coast Guard boat similar in design to the US versions. He demonstrated many features including the stitch and sew method of construction, lighting systems employing fiber optics, a remotely controlled search light, sound system and siren.

MeI presented his recently finished and christened beautifully finished Typhoon and discussed what he had learned about varnishing. Allan Wing demonstrated his solar powered boat which produces up to 120 ma on a sunny day. The receiver consumes 70 ma. He uses a modified servo as a speed control.





Phil Northrup presented his new version of a flat bottomed push boat and moved the props and Kort nozzles forward and medially to attempt to diminish cavitations noted on the Delila. He emphasized that one can build one of these models from scraps found in the garage and that it shouldnot cost an arm and a leg to construct such a model being of simple design. Phil continues to be a prodigious builder of really classy models and contributes a lot to the membership in innovations and building techniques.

Dr. Ron presented his Seattle fireboat and displayed its many features, such as a switch 16 to operate the many LED lighting circuits, water pumps and thrusters. Springer hull number 2, just out of the mold, constructed of two layers of three ounce fiberglass cloth was shown and is very light and flexible. Progress on Springer hull number two was shown. It has both air and water cooling for the 600 can motor and esc and the decks and superstructure are constructed of 2 mm styrene.



Mike Jones brought his Springer build which he plans to create into a pusher tug similar in design to Tug Boat Joe.



Following show and tell, Mike Shaw announced his Secret Santa Sale to be held on the 20th from 7 -10 PM.

With that the meeting concluded at 2035 and everyone slowly headed home.

Following the great presentation by Donovan was Larry with 4 different sailboats (including Dustyon newly acquired boat) showing the size, weight, sail, differences of the different classes that they race. The first was his new r/c duck recovery boat with tailing duckling/tow hook now being sold at the hobby store. Duck features a water jet propulsion and easy access to the protective interior.
