IN MEMORIAM by Ron Bray

Earl Anderson left us on November 9th after a relatively short course of ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease). He first became interested in model boating after observing the activities at one of our events at the Bellevue pond. His first model was a Model Shipways kit of the *Aziz* followed by several Springers and a Dolphin class tug. He made a mold using only pictures to create the plug. Several fiberglass hulls were produced, a few of which were acquired by club members. He became a very active member of our club and created numerous buoys and light houses to be used as props and navigational aids for our events. Earl could be found in his hip waders helping to set up the course for competitive events. A very detailed and intricate barge crane was constructed, a feat reflective of many years in engineering and construction. An RTR Dickey tug was totally taken apart, remodeled, repainted and refitted with new and better electronic gear. His last endeavor was building a Dumas triple cockpit Chris Craft speedboat. He spent a great deal of effort in creating the ultimate varnished finish and proudly displayed its progress at our monthly Show and Tells.

His interest in model boating obviously culminated from his many years in boating which started by racing flatties from the Laurelhurst Beach Club, when growing up. He proceeded to acquire and operate several sailboats, his last being a 40 footer. After parting with his sailboat he purchased a 42 foot *Grand Banks* and later a 49 foot *Grand Banks*. He enjoyed cruising the San Juan and Gulf Islands with his family and friends. In addition to boating the Andersons enjoyed traveling to all part of the world.

Earl's interest in the Springer boat design led him to devise some very competitive Springer Polo boats and to promote competition. There were many polo matches which he hosted at the Killarney pool in Bellevue where he resided for 40 some years. Gardening and remodeling were passions he enjoyed while living there. His red top Springers were extremely fast and maneuverable and most competitive. No one could figure out his secrets even though he was quite open to many inspections by the members. Quite a bit of research was accomplished in his test tank, measuring current draw, drive train function and floatation characteristics. Earl was always willing to help those struggling to complete their polo boats. When he learned of his illness and the dire prognosis he donated his boats, tools, radios, electronic devices and building materials to the club to be auctioned in order to raise funds for the club, a most generous gift which was truly appreciated. We will definitely miss Earl, his smiles, sense of humor, humility, leadership, expertise, love of polo matches and his contribution to the betterment of our hobby and club. In recognition of these attributes he was presented with the prestigious Cliff Shaw Award at our last Christmas dinner. We extend our condolences and sympathy to Jan, his family and friends, who realize what a special person he was.
















View From The Bridge – Bob Jacobsen


























Springer Polo, November by Ron Bray


