Northwest R/C Shipmodelers are well represented in the cover story TIDEWATER PACIFIC NORTHWEST MODEL TUG CHAMPIONSHIPS. The following summary will help you sort out the misspellings and incorrect captions when you read the article.

On the cover is a half page, full color photo of the Erie Railroad tug "PATERSON" by Ray Nelson. The cover caption on the next page is incorrectly spelled 'Patterson'. None the less an excellent photo of a fine tug.

Pages 32 and 33 include 4 great full color photos, Two of the boats belongs to club members. Brad Young's **Duwamish** (not Fearless), and **Ray Nelson's** (not Ray Wittkoph's) **Seguin** (not Sequin) Anyway, **Ron Burchett's Seaspan Regent** is captioned correctly.

Politically Correct Scale

How do you define scale when discussing your models? For discussion purposes, would you say, 3/8 inch to the foot or 1:32 scale?

Here are some definitions:

3/8 inch to 1 foot:

A simple ratio, fraction of an inch to a foot. Each foot of length on the "real" vessel is equal to 3/8" on the model.

Model Math, 101 Decimal Equivalents 3/8" = .375" divide the numerator of the fraction (3) by the denominator (8) =.375. Works for any fraction, try it.

How long is a 100' tug in 3/8 to the foot scale?

100 X .375 inches = 37.5 inches

Now what about 1:32 scale

Again a ratio, the 1 represents (in this case) a foot, and the 32 is how many 3/8" or .375" are in that foot. .375" X 32 =12".

If you know the fraction scale, say 1/8 to the foot:

First find the decimal equivalent.

1 divided by 8 = .125, the decimal equivalent of 1/8 inch. Next, divide 12 (as in how many inches in a foot) by .125.

Right **96** or 1:96 scale.

I know you knew that, I just wanted to be sure.

One last thing,

The BIG Chicago Hobby Show

On November 4 the largest hobby show in the United States opened and **Cliff Shaw** and **Bob Jacobsen** were there. The boys arrived at the show at 1:00 PM and their "retailer passes" and name tags were waiting for them. The show was open to retailers for the first two days with the public was admitted on the third day.

Bob had been to the Chicago show last year, but this was the first time for Cliff. "This place is big, REAL BIG" Cliff was quoted as

saying. The Chicago show had 22 aisles of displays compared to the 4 aisles at the Puyallup show.

Manufacturers represented at the show, included Futaba, Airtronics, JR, Ace and Dumas. Our discriminating reporters were prepared for the countless salesmen and high gloss hype.

On Saturday, the hobbyist models were on display. Cliff said it was a pleasant surprise to see many more boat models than airplane models on display. The local hobby clubs really got busy and brought out their models. there was also a large, indoor pond (plastic tarp over frame) and a program of demonstrations.

On Sunday, Bob and Cliff found their way to The **Chicago Museum of Science and Industry** to take in the historic ships section and especially the U-505. The U-505 is a W.W.II era German Type IX submarine captured by the Navy and brought to Chicago. Because of the layout of the display, Bob and Cliff were unable to photograph the deck of the sub, but took many photos from other angles. Visible in the fairing around the conning tower, battle damage from the submarines final action.

There was quite a lot of repair work done to the sub with many layers of paint covering the sins of decay.

BOAT OF THE MONTH

Finding a well crafted, operating scale vessel with interesting operating features in our club is <u>very</u> easy.

Finding a well crafted, operating scale vessel with interesting operating features that isn't a tugboat or warship takes a bit more looking.

Fortunately we have several vessels in this group, and one of the nicest is the

F/V Moonshadow built and skippered by **Keith Shermerhorn**. For the record the **F/V** prefix stands for Fishing Vessel..... I know, you knew that.

The model is in 1:24th scale or "half inch = one foot" of a 74 foot purse seiner typical to the fisheries of the Northwest United States and Southeast Alaska.

The Moonshadow is built on the Dumas, Thompson Trawler fiberglass kit. The propulsion system includes a 12 VDC Pittman motor fitted with a Dumas 3:1 gear reduction. The speed controller is a (Ah ha, here's one Steve) Vantec. The main power battery is a 12 VDC gel cell. Keith uses a Futaba 4 channel radio.

Take a close look at the Moonshadow and you will see the scratch built mast which includes booms, antenna array, lights. The lights and radar are operational, lights are R/C controlled.

The fishing gear is not only scratch built, but it is R/C operational. Keith is able to roll the **15 foot long** purse seine off *Moonshadow's* transom with the help of the "seine skiff" also scratch built. A seine skiff is a small, but very powerful boat used to pull the seine to encircle the fish, or "close the purse". Then *Moonshadow* can retrieve the purse seine by R/C.

Other scratch built features include the handlaid planked deck, and boat fenders (ping pong balls).

The **Moonshadow** has racked up an impressive list of awards including:

- 2nd place, Scale competition at the Northwest R/C Regatta 1992.
- 2nd place, Navigation competition at the Northwest R/C Regatta 1993.
- 2nd place, in class at the Anacortes Festival 1993.
- 1st place, Workboat class at the Valley Model Boat Club.
- 1st place, Workboat class at the West Vancouver Regatta.
- 1st place, Workboat class at the Valley Model Boat Club.
- 1st place, Workboat class at the Puyallup Model Expo 1992.
- BEST OF SHOW, Puyallup Model Expo 1992.

Nice job Keith, maybe we can talk you into doing a set and retrieve demo at the Polar Bear.

You have all seen the display in the hobby shops with the structural styrene shapes: I-beams, T-beams, corrugated siding.......if you look closely at the structural shapes, you have probably noticed they are very thick for their size. Well that is changing, at this writing "thin profile" structural shapes are being made. Channel and "I" sections are now available, with "H" sections available in March of 94 and angles and "T" sections near the end of the year.

The structural shapes on display looked much more proportional for scale building.
