## Member Spotlight By Dr. Ron



#### JOHN NYGAARD

John, the son of Nordic seafaring heritage, was born in Minnesota in 1936 and raised in the twin-cities. He graduated from the University of

Minnesota with a degree in mechanical engineering. While at the UOM he took flying lessons at their flight school and earned his private flight certificate. Upon completing college, he went to work for 3 M in the aerospace division for 41 years retiring in 1988. He was moved to Seattle in 1965.

While in the twin-cities, he got involved in building a fiberglass sailing pram with a group at work and also improved his nautical skills by operating a family runabout and sailboat. After moving to Seattle he joined the Pleasure Fund Club where he was able to charter sail and power boats. In 1979 he and a bought a 1959 30 foot Grandy and later bought his partner out. The all wood double planked hull boat lives happily in Friday Harbor, the gateway to some of the greatest cruising grounds in the USA.

He has been interested in model boats for the past 15 years or so with his first project a Dumas PT boat followed by a Dumas Chris Craft barrelback and currently a Chris Craft Typhoon plus a couple of RC sailboats. He also built up a 48" fiberglass deep V



powered by a modified gas engine rescued from an abandoned weed eater. Two years ago he built a fireboat which recently had some electrical (smoky) problems. He is also working on a modified Billings square rigger to replicate the vessel his grandfather captained. His father was the graduate of the West Point of Norway with a degree in engineering. He served with John's grandfather on the square rigger Njord. John joined the club 7 years ago after seeing how much fun we were having at one of our events at the Bellevue pond.

John was married after college and has a daughter who is a licensed first mate on commercial vessels traveling to all corners of the world. His oldest son is a cellular biologist and his youngest son an engineer who with John have been building spec homes. (He currently has two brand new beautiful homes on the Eastside for sale.)

John's other hobbies include RC aircraft – gas, electric and giant scale, belonging to the Marymoor RC club, and RC cars. He is an avid skier and enjoys scuba diving, working out and swimming. He began flying real aircraft while in college and belongs to the Evergreen Flying club in Renton which has two Cessna 172's and a 182.

He likes the club because of the common interests in model boating, source for technical tips and assistance as well as analysis and advice on damage control (smoked electronics) and for its resources in promoting model boating.
