Last year we introduced the first "Member of the Year Award" given to Robert Osmond at the December Dinner. I will present the 2nd year of this award at the December dinner. As last years winner, Robert is not elgible so I will enlist his help in selecting this years receiptant. The award criteria is simple and will go to the member that has consistently supported and participated in club sponsored events. Helping others in the club with modeling efforts is also an important criterion for the award.

Also at our November meeting I was suggested that we consider restoring the scale judging to our Regatta. Traditionally, scale judging has been an important aspect of our hobby. However the evolution of our hobby has made this aspect of modeling less interesting to many members. The hectic lifestyles of our younger members leave little time for time consummeing detailed modeling that was more common in the past. Many members wish to focus on the the running aspects and less on the building part of the hobby. This is very evident with the growth in interest in "ready to run" (RTR) models. These models gain even more popularity as manufacturers get better at producing more detail on ready to run models.

However, we should not disregard those that do wish to continue to build or enhance RTR models to include greater level of details and functionality.

Therefore, we will work to create a scale judging event to be held in conjucttion with our June Regatta. It will be totally optional and not included in the Navigaton part of the regatta. The regatta emphasis will continue to be on course navigation open to all types of models. The new scale event will be judged and awarded separatly for the navigaton program.

Many of the rules we used to follow for scale judging are obsolete and need to be revised to include the types of modeling most popular by our members. To define this new part of a regatta, Robert Osmond will head up a committee to define the program, judging and awards for this new contest. If you want to help out on this project let Robert know. I will ask Robert to have a full program available for

On a blustery fall night, twenty- four of us

attended the monthly meeting orchestrated by commodore, **Mel Suelzle**. Show and tell began with **Dave White** showing a great model of a Great Lakes Towing Company tow boat from the 1890s thru the 1930s. He plans to make a larger RC model of this vessel. He also showed an Orvil hook made from aluminum used to retrieve derelict vessels during the tug regatta. Dave gave a tug hull to the club which can be a club project to complete and then when done, it can be a prize or raffle item at Hobby Expo.

Bob Wickham showed the submarine belt drives obtained from Harbor Models to propel his large tug he is building. He added cooling fins to help dissipate the heat buildup as the system draws up to 15 amps. Roger Lyons has a DX9 which he offered to sell for \$200. Tom Stevens displayed his completed South Hampton modification with a functional winch, lights and independent rudders. It is equipped with 400 motors attached to gear boxes. Rex Olsen bought a cool crane from Harbor Models which he attached to his recently completed Jerry Hartman acquired tug. Bill Heath is building a large Mr. Darby and has started with the wheel house and will be constructing this

model in reverse order. **Robert Osmond** and **Tom Stevens** demonstrated the workings of a large model of a crane barge built ty Tom and acquired by Robert. **Amos Aarsvold** brought in a bunch of cupcakes to help our waistlines.

Following the break **Mel** encouraged those wishing to attend the December dinner meeting at the Lynnwood Spaghetti Factory to get their reservations in soon, as he already has twenty members signed up and no further sign ups can be made after the 31st of November. There being no further nominations for club officer positions, the nominations were closed and those candidates on the ballot were voted in. November Member Profile: Bill Heath

Bill first became interested in Northwest RC Modelers after visiting our display at the Monroe Hobby Expo in 2015. He then joined shortly thereafter and has been an enthusiastic boat modeler since. He is indebted to Tom Stevens for mentoring his modeling endeavors. However, he had built a model of the Ulyses prior to joining. Since then he built his fabulous Crowley Warrior tug, a Robbe Atlantis sailboat, a French kit of a fishing boat, and a Canadian buoy tender. He acquired a Southampton tug before building Warrior. Currently he is working on a five- foot model of the



Nanuq which is providing numerous challenges. He recently acquired five models from Bill Mc Gee, thus filling up most of his storage spaces.

Bill grew up in Cincinnati, Ohio and worked construction, after dropping out of school at the age of 16. He came west, after marrying his school sweetheart, at the urging of his second oldest brother who was in the service here. In need of cash to pay bills, he quickly hired on at Boeing as a Janitor, but in a short time he became a forklift operator. When Boeing went on strike he hired on as a laborer for a cement contractor, first with one company for five years then another for eight years. He then started his own business as a cement finisher, stone layer and tile and brick worker and retired after 33 years. However, he still does an occasional job.



He moved to Snohomish 26 years ago and acquired five acres which had a modular home. He subsequently remodeled the home and cleared the rest of the five acres which is now in grass with a large garden. He completed a G-scale railroad with over one thousand feet of track along with numerous scale buildings including hotels, mills, a frontier town and castle. He also built a heliport from which he flew RC helicopters. He started the railway project in 1999 and hosted a G-scale convention in 2010.

Several outbuildings were constructed on his lovely property where he stores his tractors, lawn mowing

equipment, trucks, cars, construction equipment and his model factory. We were able to rent space in one of his out buildings for our regatta items at half the cost of our current facility. This facility has the advantage of being far enough away to discourage members from adding items not related to our events. Bill has been very active in the club and has provided transportation of the regatta items with his large truck. We are very fortunate to have Bill and building acumen in our club.

November 3rd found the Skagit club with its second Saturday morning breakfast meeting at the Farmhouse Inn restaurant in Mt.




