signed by the late Phil Spaulding and is the most proper modern ferry you could ask for. She has exposed wiring and plumbing and duct work and is stoutly built like a naval vessel. She is painted continually and her great shape handles the Juan de Fuca swells, well, swell. Built in Seattle in 1959, modified once, and repowered around 1999. I really miss the Cooper Bessemer direct-reversing Diesels but the EMDs get the job done. We plan to ride her on her golden anniversary year late next summer. It would make a great NWRCSM field trip. You can walk on and once in Victoria walk and ride on all sorts of public and private transport. Harrison Pond is a reasonable walk through a lovely neighborhood (though you wouldn't want to be carrying a fifteen pound model for a mile) and there are lots of museums, shops, and the cute

little harbor ferries (we got to see their impressive ballet on Sunday) along with the double decker busses and the VIA railcar that still runs up island daily. The UTOPIA left while we were in town (she rents for \$695,000 a week plus fuel and food) and we missed a Seaspan log dumping barge dumping by just five minutes while on our way up to Ladysmith.

Well the big day for the bride and groom happened on Saturday, July 12th, in LaConner, WA. The secret location was at the home of a NW artist who transformed an old rock quarry into a beautiful garden for his sculptures. The weather was a bit warm (low 80's), no breeze and the water at the pond was in good shape for what was about to transpire. Now I have been in contact with the groom for the last month on this secret operation. The only ones that knew of this were bride/ groom, best man/maid of honor, officiator, and property owner. All others were clueless as to why a model boat was there. Met with the best man where he informed me as to what the "signal" for the delivery was to be and I informed him as to where the delivery point would be. Once all communications had been established it was time to get the tug and barge all set up. The boat for the job would be my vintage tug "Liberty" delivering the rings on the lumber barge. Best practice for this was to take the barge on the "hip" so that the delivery would be as close to the shore as possible. With the tug & barge all dressed it was only a matter of time to wait for the ceremony to begin. Now the rings would not get placed on the barge until the ceremony started (as to make sure no one in the gallery figured it out or they got lost!). Now just for safety, I did tie a yellow float to the pillows/ rings just in case of worse case scenario.

When the time came, the best man signaled by acting as if he had LOST the rings! The gallery bought it as the next thing they see is a tug and barge working their way over to the ceremony with the rings on a silver platter. The reaction was priceless. Gasp, giggles laughter, applause! Now just had to stick the landing. Did so on the first attempt and the delivery made. But the job was not done at that point. Rushed the tug/barge back to where I was (off to the side) for phase 2 of the operation. Untie the barge from the hip to take it on the wire. Clear the deck of all flowers and delivery



equipment to install a "just married" banner, fireworks (on the stern) and a couple of "cans" behind the barge. With every thing installed at Indy 500 speed, was time to set sail just after the "I Dos" and the couple presented to the gallery. As they made their way out, fireworks were lit and the banner began its tour around the pond to the sound of applause and laughter. All in all, it was a great time. It was rewarding to have people in the gallery come up and compliment on the great job of driving and creativity. Member Spotlight By Dr. Ron

DAVE FERAY

Dave arrived on this planet in 1945 and grew up in Houston, Texas. He earned a degree in mechanical engineering from Texas A and M and launched his career in machinery engineering for the oil refining industry with his biggest project being a 25,000 horsepower air blower for a catalytic cracking unit.



It's not surprising that he is attracted to model boats as he has been around boating all of his life. His father had a 34 foot Chris Craft sedan cruiser which was destroyed by hurricane Carla in 1962. Dave owned small and large boats including a 42 foot Grand Banks and a 32 foot Albin. He chartered several times in the San Juan with friends. He was finally hooked on the Pacific Northwest while attending a refinery machinery meeting at the Cherry Point refinery. He decided to move to this area which he did after retiring last year after 24 years with Lyondell-CITGO. He spent 26 years with the Coast Guard Auxiliary doing search and rescue operations, with some of his time in education.

His modeling began 6 years ago with construction of a Model Slipways "Loyal Tender." While on a trip to Oregon he stumbled across the Tualatin Crawdad Festival fun float and was introduced to our club by Gordon Canney who let him run his tug. Because he lives in Lynden, he has been active in the Skagit R/C arm of our club and regularly attends their meetings. He has also become a member of the Burnaby club and is an active participant in their events.

His first project after moving to Washington was a Springer, the "Ginny D" which he constructed in his well equipped work shop. His most recent project is an LPG barge equipped with a pump in order to control ballast.

Dave was married to Ginny in 1968 and they have two children; a son 28 who is a sous chef in California and a daughter 37 who lives in Houston. Ginny has been very active in the culinary aspects of our regattas and The Foss Cup and always has a smile. Dave's other hobby is helping Ginny with their large flower garden.



Dave would like to see more of a pot luck food format for our functions. With a little planning this could be organized weeks ahead of the event. He suggested taking new members under the wing of one of our more seasoned members making sure that the newbie be contacted before meetings and events and to help them feel more welcomed to the group.
